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Liberty George Project

After 'Liberty George' Dukov attended the October 2017 Club meeting in Las Vegas, he returned to the New York City area and started a new project to build a large-size Liberty mask using the national flag of approximately 156 nations for the facial cover.

George was invited to do this project at LaGuardia Community College, Long Island City (across the East River from Manhattan).

This is the third large-size mask George created in his many years producing Liberty masks; each mask has a specific theme.

The first large-size mask uses pictures of individuals responsible for the concept, funding and building of the Statue and had been displayed, several years ago, on Liberty Island. Interestingly, that mask also used national flags at Liberty's crown area; the first large-size mask is shown on page 7 of this newsletter.

The second large-size mask was created to honor the First Responders who died at the World Trade Centers during the September 11, 2001 attack on America. George donated that mask to a memorial honoring those First Responders.



The third mask is 6 feet tall, 4 feet wide and 3 feet deep ... when the crown spikes are included, the mask is 8 feet tall. The crown spikes can be seen in the background of the picture below. This mask is still at LaGuardia Community College and will eventually be mounted on a wall at the college.

George expects to again visit the U.S., from his home in Bulgaria, this coming summer.



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In The Shadow Of Liberty: A Roman Odyssey By Jeffrey S. Dosik

Between March 17-27, 2017 I went on an 11-day international seminar study

trip to the United Kingdom (England, Wales and Scotland) with the faculty and students of my undergraduate college: Orange County Community College (SUNY Orange) of Middletown, NY. As a group we visited the major attractions in the United Kingdom: London, Stonehenge, Cardiff, Liverpool, Stratford-upon-Avon, Bath and Edinburgh.

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During our visit to Bath, England we visited the famous Roman Baths (Aquae Sullis: The Waters of Sullis). The Romans founded Bath, England in 63 AD as the Roman town of Aquae Sullis with a population of 2,000 people. During our visit to the Roman Baths I realized that it was through the prism of the Roman Empire, that we have the origins of the concept of "Liberty".

The Roman contribution to the origins of "Liberty" was their creation of two types of law:

jus civile, "the law of the community" which applies only to Roman citizens and dates back to a time when Rome consisted of just seven hills inhabited by a primitive agricultural community, and

jus gentium, the body of law that settled disputes that arose between Roman citizens and foreigners.

It was this second interpretation of these two bodies of Roman law that was preserved over the centuries to our modern world with increasing emphasis on the existence of a universal concept of law "Liberty" which is applicable to

all mankind.

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In 528 A.D. the Eastern Roman Emperor Justinian authorized a group of talented Roman jurists under the Roman Jurist Tribonian to organize the immense mass of centuries old legal precedents, juridical opinions and imperial edicts that constituted Roman law into a four

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volume work the: "Corpus Juris Civilis" (The Body of Civil Law). The "Corpus" would survive down through the centuries to return to Western Europe in the twelfth century to form a synthesis. To create the rational legal systems of the developing nation-states of Europe. A development which would encourage the political philosophers of seventeenth and eighteenth Western Europe: John Locke, Jean Jacques Rosseau, Voltaire and Montesquieu with their ideas of good government: "The Social Contract Theory of Government" that all power for government comes from "We The People" and "Separation of Powers" in government (executive, legislative, judicial) to check and balance power in civilized societies.

It was the legalistic Roman mind which laid the foundations for our modern world. In his monumental work: "The Statue of Liberty Encyclopedia", Barry Moreno writes:

"The Statue of Liberty is a modern allegorical representation of "Libertas" a goddess of ancient Rome. Libertas, the personification of liberty and personal freedom ordained by the Roman state, emerged from the Roman law of freedom (libertas) and was fully deified in the 4th century B.C. in an official state cult under the name of Jupiter Libertas.

Her original association with Jupiter, king of the Roman gods, was due to the legal origin. Her worship was more common among individuals than within social groups: she was a personal goddess.

Freed slaves were especially devoted to her. A famous votive offering to Libertas was a painting depicting a First Punic War battle in which slaves are shown securing their manumission; it was placed in a temple (aedes), built for her in 238 B.C. In the following

century, the Roman statesman and reformer Tiberius Sempronius Gracchus (168-133 B.C.) built an even more glorious temple to Libertas on the Aventine Hill of Rome. One of the famous: "Seven Hills of Rome". This temple probably of Greek design, would have been furnished with her idol, a sacrificial altar, lamps, basins

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for ceremonial washings and benches. In the 1st century B.C. the orator Asinius Pollio placed a statuary idol of the goddess in the Roman Forum. There was also an Atrium Libertatis (Atrium of Liberty) in a part of the Forum of Trajan that was known as the Ulpian Basilica.

The temples of Libertas had state priests who presided over the ceremonial offerings of sacrifices and prayers and the celebration of public festivities to her glorification. During these celebrations, cult images and objects dedicated to the goddess were displayed to worshippers. Her sacred attributes included the vindicta, the pileus, the sceptre and at her feet, a broken vase and a cat. The vindicta was the rod or staff with which a slave was tapped to grant manumission.

The pileus (Phrygian bonnet or cap of freedom) was worn by emancipated slaves to proclaim their status as freedmen. The scepter signified the goddess's dominion over mankind; the cat, which had not yet been domesticated in Rome, represented the natural instinct for freedom; and the broken vase symbolized the end of confinement. Under the regime of Julius Caesar, the cult of the goddess became associated with political liberty. In 48 B.C. Julius Caesar issued denarii coins bearing the likeness of the goddess to strengthen his claim of being a liberator of the Romans. But his assassins, Brutus and Cassius (who had accused him of despotism) exalted Libertas on their own denarii, showing two daggers and a pileus".

In designing the "The Statue of Liberty Enlightening the World" in the 1870's and early 1880's, the French artist Auguste Bartholdi clothed Lady Liberty in the same fashion as other statues of classical Roman female deities. She wears a palla, a cloak which is fastened on her left shoulder by a clasp.



Underneath she wears a stola which falls to her sandaled feet in many folds, and in her left arm she holds a book of law inscribed in Roman numerals: "July 4, 1776", all within the shadow of liberty.

So, back to the age appropriate gifts, Kathy has agreed to accept donations from club members and see that the children attending the ceremony receives a gift showing The Statue of Liberty from a Living Liberty (Kathy) at the ceremony. The New York 2019 Club Meeting planning is underway. This visit will have some changes to it. First, our preferred hotel is slated for demolition and we need to find another location. Second, the new museum on Liberty Island is scheduled to open in 2019!

We have been spoiled getting both an affordable room rate and a meeting room where we could bring in our own food. I'm calling on all members especially those that live in the NYC area and those that travel there, to help locate a suitable location for our club meeting. In searching the internet there's an overwhelming list of thousands of locations. What we need is someone with inside or personal knowledge of a hotel. Anyone with family members that are connected with a NYC hotel, have read about a "hidden gem", or heard of a hotel that could fit our needs to respond.

All of the major chains are costly just for the meeting room and food service. In the past, we paid under \$100 per attendee for our all-day Saturday gathering and food/beverage.

The Yotel across the street would be \$300+/person for the meeting room and food. There's a new POD style hotel that's affordable and popular. Perfect for those that just need a clean room in a good location without lots of floor space. If you have traveled in Europe, you probably remember rooms of this limited size. However, accommodations for a family of 4 is not possible unless booking 2 rooms. Meeting room ability is still yet to be determined. **We need your help!**

The dates are tentative for early October 2019 but could be adjusted slightly to the opening of the new museum on Liberty Island. We hope to have a tour of the public exhibits and a behind the scenes tour of the archived items. This is a rare opportunity to experience both.

Requesting: Research information on an affordable hotel and meeting space. Please inquire on room rate and potential meeting space for 25-50 attendees before forwarding. Our room rate goal is \$200+taxes/night single or double occupancy located within a few blocks of Times Square or very close to a subway station. All day meeting space needs to be under \$500/day or \$1,500 with buffet dinner service included (based on 20 attendees). Qualified locations will be easier to narrow down.

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Dear Friends A little feedback about our visit at the Bartholdi Museum on Saturday, October 14, 2017 for the inauguration of the temporary exhibit "Bartholdi, portrait intime du sculpteur" translated by myself as "Insights in Bartholdi's private life". [Curator Isabelle] Mrs Bräutigam was very happy to welcome Roseline and myself in her inaugural address to the numerous audience.

The mayor of Colmar and Régis Hueber weren't present. The SAMBA [**ED**: Société des Amis du Musée Bartholdi: Society of Friends of the Bartholdi Museum] yes.



And indeed, there were a lot of historical artifacts displayed, some of them for the first time, in the room, where we presented a couple of years ago [2008], the Bas Relief of Don Wiegand, gift of our club to the museum.

Mr Belot (right) explained Bartholdi, through the eyes of the historian he is, and provided some anecdotes which were displayed. (Bartholdi's testament, his childhood in



Paris with his brother, the hidden age of his wife,

the freemasonry, the Annexation of Alsace Lorraine to the German empire, his assistance to Gustave Eiffel to overcome the opposition to the building of the Eiffel Tower, the aim to give the house in Colmar to the City as a retirement residence. Luckily, today the Museum ...) well, a lot of interesting stuff, I wasn't aware about.



On the red strip, a lot of explanation of Bartholdi's activities throughout his life, in various important time slots, and on the top and bottom of this red line, major global events often in America, Europe, and local events impacting both his private and professional life, especially World Fairs, and the annexation of Alsace to the German Empire.

Alsacian wine and pastries was served later, whereas with Roseline and myself, we strolled in the Museum.

I was really surprised by the efforts done by Mrs Bräutigam to refurbish a lot of rooms of the American level in the House. Great job and a lot of explanation handouts in French. Good job. <u>For your next visit to Colmar</u>, a guided tour in this floor and pictures would be a must. Enclosed a couple of pictures taken this day, actually not easy because of the people and the narrow displays in the rooms. Anyhow, we hope you will enjoy it.

An additional note from Vince Swift: In addition to the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor, there is another very important historic American site only 1 mile distant, **Ellis Island**. While many European immigrants first saw America by way of the Statue on the horizon, they first experienced America on Ellis Island – my maternal grandfather was one of those immigrants, from Italy, in 1905.

Over the years, the U.S. government has restored The Great Hall and a few of the many buildings used during the active life of Ellis Island (1892-1954).
