
National Treasure 2: Book of Secrets (a.k.a. NT2) ~ by Brian Snyder


The follow-up to the 2004 box office surprise "National Treasure" has just finished showing in the USA theaters and will soon be available on DVD. For our French friends, it's titled "Benjamin Gates et le livre des secrets". If you had a chance to see this action packed movie then you saw the references and images of the Statue of Liberty.

There were a few errors about the Statue of Liberty in the film that only Liberty aficionados and visitors to France's Liberties would catch. In the movie, they are chasing down clues to solve a puzzle and one of the clues is on the statue in the Jardin du Luxembourg. But they go to the statue on the River Seine! The clue was on the flame of the statue, but of course it is only there for the movie.

The company that is doing the bonus materials for the DVD contacted me through club member Jeff Dosik. They were looking for images of the statue in New York, near Grennell Island in the river Seine and Jardin du Luxembourg. Laurent Ghesquière and I supplied images to them and we are both excited to see how they are used.

The major funding for the move was from Walt Disney Studios, and the Liberty location error was determined when we supplied images to the Bonus DVD supplier, and WDS was contacted. Of course it was too late to make a change, as it was 2 weeks from its December 13, 2007 premier in New York. WDS said the bonus materials would follow the story line.







Did you know there is a connection between Gutzon Borglum, the sculptor of Mt. Rushmore, and the Statue of Liberty? In 1916, the original copper-clad and gilded torch was replaced with one designed by Borglum, composed of six hundred pieces of yellow glass. That torch, more beautiful than practical, now resides in the museum in the base of the statue. The beacon was prone to leakage, and the iron ribs, part of its construction, did not expand and contract with the copper sheathing, and was quite rusted when replaced with the current golden torch, one more similar in style to the original.

Mailing Address







This Month's Featured Image ~ by Brendagael Beasley~Forrest



You may have seen this image, as it was a very popular email that was going around in December. Several club members sent this to me to include in the newsletter: Lindsay MacDonald, Bob Weaver, Adela French, and Ann Bartlett. During the WWI years, 1914-1918, Arthur S. Mole and John D. Thomas made some incredible human pictures by using thousands of sailors or soldiers in uniform to create several patriotic images, including Uncle Sam, the U.S. flag, an American eagle, the Liberty Bell, and the Statue of Liberty, pictured above. The image seen here was taken on a stifling hot day in July of 1918 at Camp Dodge in Iowa and utilizes 18,000 men in uniform. According to the Fort Dodge newspaper the following day, many men fainted, dressed in woolen uniforms as the temperature neared 105°, intensified by the mass formation of men. The photo, taken from the top of a specially constructed tower by the Chicago photography studio Mole & Thomas, was intended to help promote the sale of war bonds, but was never used.

The design for the living picture was laid out with thousands of yards of white tape fastened to the ground, forming the outlines on which the 18,000 men marched to their positions. The area of ground covered, from the front row at the base to the tip of the torch, was 1,235 feet, nearly a quarter mile. Due to the vast distance, the farther away from the camera, the more men it took to maintain the aspect ration of the design. There are twice as many men in the torch alone as in the entire remaining design; and eight times as many men in the arm, torch and flame as in all the rest of the figure. Some are in lighter uniforms, some are facing backwards, some have their faces looking upward with no hat, and some have hats on and facing forward, in order to create the light and dark lines of demarcation within the picture. Who knew a photograph could require such engineering!

Member Profile: Kitty Gustafson



HELLO KITTY! (Sorry—I couldn't resist!) Kathleen "Kitty" Gustafson is one of our earlier club members to join—#61, according to club records. She has been called Kitty ever since first grade, where her school principal was also named Kitty. She began her Statue of Liberty collection before the 1976 Bicentennial, and continued as more commemorative dates were celebrated. As a middle and junior high school teacher, Gustafson wanted her children to respect our country, the flag and other symbols of patriotism. Kitty found out about the Liberty club in an article she read in the *Chicago Tribune* about SOL collectors and club president, Iris November. "I knew I had to meet her," says Kitty. And she did, in 1993, when she went to the first convention in NYC. "I have attended 3 meetings in NYC, 2 in Las Vegas, 1 in France, and 1 in Rochester, NY," she says.

Kitty prefers SOL items that are more realistic than fantasy, in her collection of about 50 SOLs, plus coins, ephemera and books. "My most unique and special SOL item is a miniature gift shop (pictured right) that was made for me by Sandra Whipple, a former student and life-long friend," Kitty says. "The gift shop sells only Statue of Liberty items. She also made me a pocket watch with the Statue in it."

Kitty retired in 1994 after 33 years of teaching. "I loved teaching and the opportunities it presented to give a positive influence to the children," she says. When I taught French, the children learned to sing *La Marseillaise*. In Paris, in 1995, I sang for our French colleagues. They were amazed that any American knew the entire verse and chorus to their national anthem!" Kitty reports that her retirement has been a very happy time. Like a true educator and life learner, she continues her education by participating in Elder-hostels. "I revisited Williamsburg and Mount Vernon last fall," she says. "American history is very important—especially now. We have a great past."



In addition to her Liberty collection, Gustafson has a patriotic Christmas tree that is white with only red, white and blue ornaments on it. It stays up all year to celebrate other patriotic days. Kitty has lived in Illinois all her life. When she sold her house in Glenview, she knew that she did not want to live alone, so she moved to Barrington Hills to be with her sister Elaine. "My sister and I have always been close and we decided to combine resources and move in together. Elaine's husband Gordon is very congenial and I have my own apartment in our rather large house," she says. Kitty and her family have four dogs, all labs. Elaine had brought home three darling puppies when they were only six weeks old. "The three sisters named Alice, Abby and Annie. The male dog is Andy and he is younger that the girls. Two are chocolate, one black, and one is honey-colored," says Kitty.



We are in Arizona now and visited with James Muir in Sedona, the sculptor of the Liberté bronze bust that we own. He and his wife, Linda, have built a gallery and studio overlooking the red buttes of Sedona. Glorious! We also were lunch guests of Linda's delightful mother, Billy Sue McEntire, which reminds us to be grateful for the special friends we are privileged to make in our lives, and how treasured each one is.

At present, his major piece, to be finished by September, is a 6'3" bronze of Thomas Jefferson signing, with a feather pen at his own designed desk, the papers for the establishment of West Point! James was commissioned by the Class of 1968 to do this piece and it will be dedicated at West Point. His other commissions are in various stages of clay, smaller maquettes of the larger pieces, and also, one I hope to own, the 12" high bronze model of the afore-mentioned SoL costumed girl. It's lovely and is on a base, including the 3 books (and Mort knows I really like it!!!)

We had a chance to see his completed Statue of Liberty costumed little girl, and the newspaper delivery boy—standing 48" and 53" respectively, in bronze of course. The models for these were the grandchildren of the owner of the newspaper where the original "newsboy" stands. The new delivery boy wears a hat fashioned from a page from the original newspaper, and "liberty" "freedom" and "justice" are featured predominantly, including the title on the three books each of these statues stand on. As James says, there can be no liberty and justice without truth!





Grian found this neat article about a cheese carver in Little Chute, Wisconsin. Troy Landwehr's Lady Liberty was crafted from hundreds of pounds of fine Wisconsin cheddar. Four days of carving were reduced to a 4½-minute piece on *Tracey Ullman's State of the Union* on Showtime. "Proportionality is the hardest part," says Landwehr. "You carve a little, step back, carve a little bit more then step back again." An eight-inch model of the New York landmark sat at its base among knives, tools, and chunks & shreds of cheddar.






Are there other "live" or continuously burning Liberties?

Birmingham's Statue of Liberty is visible to motorists driving on the southern outskirts of Birmingham on the Interstate 459 bypass. Located in a commercial development, Liberty Park, the statue is lighted at night and her flame burns continuously. From the plaque at the site: "A bronze replica, one-fifth the size of the Statue of Liberty, was commissioned by Frank Park Samford as the symbol for the company he founded, Liberty National Life Insurance Company. Created by sculptors Archer and Lee Lawrie, the statue was cast in Sommerville Haut Marine, France, in 1956 and was placed atop Liberty National's home office building in downtown Birmingham and then moved to its present location and dedicated on July 4, 1989."
